## Free Skin Cancer Checks Coming to Goongerah, Tubbut & Bendoc – 8 & 9 December 2025

Lauren from MoleMap in Bairnsdale is excited to be visiting the Goongerah, Tubbut and Bendoc communities this December to offer **free full-body skin checks** for local residents, funded from E2S.

#### What is MoleMap?

MoleMap is a leading skin cancer detection service that specialises in the early identification and monitoring of skin cancers and melanoma. Our comprehensive skin checks combine full-body checking with a dermatoscope (a specialised magnifying tool) from your scalp to soles of the feet, close-up imaging of any suspicious spots using a specialised camera, and expert analysis of the imaged spots by specialist Dermatologists. We help detect skin cancers at an earlier, more treatable stage—potentially saving lives.

#### Who am I?

My name is **Lauren Brookes**, and I'm a senior **Melanographer** with MoleMap and opened the Bairnsdale clinic in 2019. I am an AHPRA Registered Nurse of 20 years, with most of my nursing life working in Bairnsdale Hospitals Emergency Department. I'm passionate about educating my patients and community about sun safety and skin cancers and the importance of skin checks and early detection of skin cancers. I am thrilled to be able to provide this service to your community.

#### What's on offer?

I'll be offering **free full-body skin checks** for residents of **Tubbut** in the morning of **Monday 8th** and **Bendoc** in the afternoon of **Monday 8th December** and **Goongerah** in the morning of Tuesday **9th December 2025**. Each check includes:

- A thorough examination of your skin from head to toe
- Imaging of any moles or lesions that appear suspicious
- Expert Dermatologist review of any imaged lesions
- A detailed report with any recommendations for treatment or review, along with the photos

Sun safety education and advice These skin checks are completely **free of charge**, but **appointments are essential** as spots are limited.

#### Why book a skin check?

Skin cancer is so common in Australia, and early detection is key. By the age of 70, 2 out of 3 people will have been diagnosed with a skin cancer. Even if you haven't noticed any changes or don't think you're at high risk, it's still a good idea to get your skin checked—especially if you spend time outdoors, have fair skin, or have a history of sun exposure or sunburn.

# Far East Gippslland Track Clearing

#### Far East Gippsland Track Clearing 16-19 October 2025 By Andrew Mortlock – Pajero 4WD Club member

Another great Track Clearing event was staged in Far East Gippsland from 16<sup>th</sup> to 19<sup>th</sup> October. The 19<sup>th</sup> annual event organised by Parks Victoria and this year in the Snowy River National Park and the Errinundra National Park.

Volunteers from the Pajero, Land Rover, Range Rover and Ineos 4WD Clubs took part in the adventure, guided by 6 Parks Victoria Rangers and assisted by the Friends of Errinundra.

We journeyed up to Bendoc to our camp site at Wilson's Hut, a lovely camp site next to a century old hut. It was a beautiful place to wake up to each day, with Kookaburras sounding the alarm and Flame Robins and Tree Creepers providing the breakfast entertainment along with the "Dawn Chorus".

#### Thursday 16<sup>th</sup>

A total of 10 volunteers were on hand along with two Parks Rangers (David Butterworth (Butters) and Will), and Kerry from the Friends of Errinundra group. Our specific task was to clear the Rooty Break and Goonmirk Rocks walking tracks in the Errinundra National Park, which had both become overgrown and difficult for walkers to access. We started on the Rooty Break Track, a lovely walk that winds its way down from Goonmirk Rocks Rd to Coast Range Rd. We divided into two groups to attack it from each end. A large tree crown blocked a section at the bottom, but the chainsaws whirred and removed it in quick time. A leech dined on my leg to provide the only low light of the day!

We moved on to the Goonmirk Rocks Track, a relatively short track which loops around the highest part of the Errinundra, around 1,000m above sea level. There was not much work here for the chainsaws, but the brush cutters had the track looking very nice again for the walkers. Kerry, our Friends of Errinundra rep, and John Hasler provided some fascinating information about the various plant species in the area



#### Friday 17<sup>th</sup>

Another couple increased our volunteer numbers to 12, along with 4 Parks Rangers. Today's task was to clear the Old Growth Walk. It is a stunning 5km return walk in Errinundra NP, which winds through some of Errinundra's tallest and oldest trees, including Mountain Ash, Messmate, Shining Gums and Grey Gums, not to mention the towering tree ferns. The weather today was highlighted by low cloud and drizzling rain, conditions which brought the enchanting rainforest to life. It was hard to focus on our tasks and not get lost in the beauty of the forest.

We divided into 3 groups, each with specific equipment and tasks. 4 of us went with Ranger Gary to carry chainsaws and support equipment to clear any large timber off the track. Carrying that amount of equipment was arduous, but we pushed our way through the dripping tree ferns. We finally made it to the end, where we found a huge tree crown which had fallen on the board walk and destroyed sections of it. After documenting the damage we started the return walk, clearing some large trees along the way. It was hard work, and it was a relief to finally make it back to the vehicles.

#### Saturday 18th

The focus now shifted to the Snowy River National Park. Some of my favourite tracks are in this region and the adrenaline and anticipation surged at the thought of opening and clearing the Snowy tracks. The work force had now increased to around 25, including 20 volunteers from the 4WD clubs as well as 5 Parks Rangers. I can't speak highly enough of the Rangers, who's local knowledge was invaluable. It was great to see Area Chief Ranger Dave Burton, along with Butters, Robyn, Gary and Mel to lead our teams, and we soaked up their stories and experience about managing such an enormous and iconic National Park, along with their knowledge of the flora and fauna of the parks. Over the years of attending this event I have developed such a close bond with the Rangers, and I have learnt so much about this amazing country and about the dedication of this amazing group of Parks Vic professionals.

My team was led by Rangers Butters and Robyn, and our task was to open and clear the Bowen Track, along with Reeds Track and the northern part of the Deddick Trail.

It was a stunning low-range drive, and only two medium sized fallen trees slowed us up a bit, not making too much of a dent on the 2-stroke. We stopped for lunch on Mt Tower and took in the breathtaking views, highlighted by the snow-covered Main Range and Mt Kosciuszko in the distance.

We eventually popped out on to McKillops Bridge Rd and made the bone rattling drive back along the corrugated road to Bendoc, where we met up with the other groups for a lovely BBQ dinner, followed by a Q&A session with the Rangers. It was the perfect end to an amazing 3 days.

Some of the volunteers stayed on to help with further track clearing In Errinundra on the Sunday, however we had to make tracks back to Melbourne and we said our goodbyes.

### THE ALAM FAMILY

INTRODUCTION:

John Alam recently visited Bill Beard on Delagate Hill. During their conversation John mentioned he had been a resident of Delagate during the years 1934 until 1946. John's father, George Alam bought the shop, (heoretow closed, next to Delegate Hutel) from Mr. Peter Joseph, where he also set up the Ford Agency and put in petrol pumps and a gerage. Below is reproduced information about Delegate when the Alam family lived there, taken from tapes which John Alam kindly sent to us.

John Alam: At the shop site there was a bakery and, in fact, the whole block had been built around with various sheds including a cow shed and a chook shed. We used to milk, and such was the life in Delegate when we moved there in 1934.

There were six children in the family. My mother hed been a school teacher whom my father had met out in the Riverine.

I have my sister Margaret with me (now Margaret Michael). She bought that business from Bill Ingram (thesame business as where) in 1948. Margaret and her husband Alan were there from the years 1948 to approx. 1965, when the business was then solid to Noel Begley.

Also hare is my sister Dorothy. She was aix months of age when we first arrived in Delegate in 1934, and like my brothers and sisters, was educated at the local convent school at Delegate. I myself went there until 1944, then I followed in my father's footsteps and went to St. Joseph's College. My three sisters, Inex (the eldest), Margaret and Dorothy, went down to boarding school in Glebe Point.

Derothy Alam: I went back to Delgate in 1954 and I was teaching at the local public school there. It was a two teacher school at the time. I was the assistant. I taught there for about a term, and then I was transferred to Bombala Central School, where my husband was teaching.

John Alam: And Margaret you reised in all, ten children in Delegate? You've since added an eleventh since being in Sydeny.

John Alam: Tell us some of the circumstances, and what Delegate was like in 1934 Dod? George Alam: Delegate was a good old country town alright. Of course you move into a climate altogether different to the rest of the state. Delegates climate is exceptional really, altogether different. Delegate is nice little town, there's no question about that Right out of this world. Anything that you bought along, innovation wise, was always a god send to the people and they showed their appreciation alright. The climate, well it was really a climate! It was enjoyable, and it was the greatest place in the world to rear a family of young children,—so long as you're wealthy enough to keep them wars. There's nothing wrong with Delegate. It is quite a good solid district and good people there. They've got to be good to stay there. Their surroundings are really first rate for any man inclimed to the outdoors. You've got all tyces of weather in both summer and winter.

The main road was quite as good as the rest of the state, but once you left the main road, well, you'd want to be used to the type of country and be prepared for it, and take your implements with you, like your chain saw.

George Alam:

Starting the Ford Agency there was a bit of an eye opener. The people thought Delegate was saturated with care but it hadn't been started even. Everyone had a car within a short time . ofter that.



John Alam: One of the old residents of Delegate Hill was Bill Heidemann.

- 8il had a T Model Ford. He lived on the south eastern side of the hill. He would drive his fabulous old Model T Ford in each Saturday, and he would park it in front of the store with great gusto, along with half a dozen of your traded in cars plus any new model ford that you had down from Sydney.

George Alam: Oh, there was only one Heidemann you know. He wasn't a weelthy man by any means, but livingout in a spot like he did — he lived well. He was very sincere when he came in once and he wanted me to give him a new car, either Ford or any other type that I would sell him, in exchange for his old one. He wasn't joking. He wanted a new car for his car, and of course, that same car would buy two new cars, but in those days no-because most of the cars in those days that were running around were as êld as his but in better condition.

John Alam: We used to go down to Cabanandra on Boxing Day for the races and on the following day the proceeds were shared between the two hospitals of Orbost in the south, and Delegate in the north. That was quite an annual event. What do you remember about Cabanandra?

George Alam: Cabanandra was the same as the rest of Delegate, in that it was just as cold. Its a very pretty spot and the people there were a particularly nice type of people. They had to be to live down there. They were lucky to have a good main road.

John Alam: You told us about Mrs. Ingram (Mrs.J. H. Ingram), who had eighteen children.

George Alam: Yes, eighteen children, no doctors. She was a lovely old lady.

When I knew her she had had the eighteen children and they were grown up.

She was really a remarkably good woman, a really good woman, and her husband was known as Rajah. He was a Rajah too, even at his age. He was a father to eighteen and to rear eighteen he was a good man, and I mean good in every respect.

John Alam: Reg, one of the sons later set up a store at Bonang.

George Alam: And it was very successful too, and Reg was quite a good fellow.

George Alam: And it was very successful too, and Reg was quite a good fellow.

Very sturdily built he was, and quite a capable chep. A good family man, I

don't think he had a big family from memory but he was a good store keeper and a
good man for the district, there was no doubt about him.



Dohn Alem: Another well known men down there was Harold C'Hare, who used to be a good friend of yours, somewhat of an accentric fellow. He was also something of an inventor. He had a hot air engine down there carly in the 1940's, that he had patented, but I don't think that ever came to anything.

George Alam: He had an idea of inventing the perpetual motion, and he wasn't joking-but he was a good chap though, Harold, the seem to be able to get to the bottom of him, where as other people couldn't. He may have been bashful but in other ways he was quite bright. He still figured that he could get perpetual motion, which of course was an extrame idea. \*\* \*\*Carringed the issue).\*\* ALAM TO WARD.

## News from the Shire

### Council launches new pool and spa safety inspection

With warmer weather on the way, East Gippsland Shire Council is reminding residents to make sure their pools and spas are safe and meet state safety regulations.

To help, Council has launched a new Pool and Spa Safety Barrier Compliance Inspection Service, giving property owners another simple option to meet their obligations.

For \$385, the service includes:

An initial inspection by a Council building inspector A written report
One follow-up inspection
Issue of a Certificate of Barrier Compliance
Lodgement on Council's database


Victorian regulations require all pools and spas capable of holding more than 300mm of water to have a compliant safety barrier. They must also be registered with Council if they remain erected for three or more consecutive days. Otherwise, owners must either register by the fourth day or dismantle the structure.

#### This includes:

In-ground and above-ground swimming pools Spas, hot tubs and jacuzzis Indoor pools Inflatable and relocatable pools

Council's new service is optional – residents can continue to engage a private registered building inspector if they prefer.

### Council welcomes proposed improvements to mobile coverage

East Gippsland Shire Council has welcomed the release of the Federal Government's draft legislation on its Universal Outdoor Mobile Obligation (UOMO) that will expand mobile service coverage across the country.

The UOMO will require mobile carriers to provide reasonable access to mobile services outdoors almost everywhere across Australia, benefiting remote and rural pockets of East Gippsland.

Council has extensively advocated for more reliable telecommunications infrastructure in the region, particularly following the 2019-20 bushfires. This work has included ongoing collaborative work with telecommunications providers, working in partnership with the Australian Local Government Association and developing a unified approach with other Gippsland councils. Priority advocacy areas have included voice and data telecommunications becoming a regulated essential service, mandating emergency roaming for all carriers, mandatory infrastructure reliability standards, investment to enhance the reliability of infrastructure in the context of climate change and a community partnership model in remote areas to maintain backup infrastructure prior to and during events.

Mayor Cr John White said this new legislation will be critical in securing more widespread and reliable telecommunications coverage for the shire's rural and remote communities, offering more equitable access to services and digital technologies.

"This obligation is a step in the right direction; however, further improvements are needed to strengthen telecommunications services and infrastructure in our shire. Key areas of focus for our future advocacy efforts include improvements to emergency roaming, mandatory service reliability standards and more reliable back-up infrastructure for remote areas," John said.

"These changes to the way telecommunications services are delivered in East Gippsland will help our towns to become more reliably connected, especially at critical times like when disasters strike and our remote communities become isolated.

"We will continue to proactively campaign for these improvements on behalf of our communities and work with all levels of government to encourage more reliable and equitable telecommunications access that supports community safety and connectedness."

Other telecommunications improvements introduced in the shire include supporting our local incident management plans with the installation of Sky Muster satellites at 45 identified assembly areas, as part of the national Strengthening Telecommunications Against Natural Disasters (STAND) program.

"The work we completed with these communities across East Gippsland before and after Black Summer ensured the successful rollout of the program, which included 38 sites with AV/TV installations to support utilising the STAND systems," John said.

In addition, high-risk and more remote sites had more resilient power systems installed, with some remaining sites set to receive these upgrades in the future.

Emergency screens strategically located across the shire also provide emergency information, and the new East Gippsland Emergency Dashboard can assist the community to be better prepared and informed before, during and after an emergency

#### Council moves road maintenance contract to Whelans

East Gippsland Shire Council has announced a change to its road maintenance arrangements, with Whelans Group to take on additional responsibility for maintaining the region's road network.

Whelans has assumed delivery of services spanning areas west of Orbost to the shire border, and north through to Omeo and Benambra, which were previously managed by Cranes Asphalting & Bitumen Sealing Pty Ltd.

The move follows a formal agreement between the two contractors and Council, ensuring a smooth handover and continued maintenance across the shire.

Whelans had been managing two areas, which predominantly serviced the Far and Northeast sections of the municipality. It will now expand delivery of services to cover all areas of the shire.

Council's Acting CEO, Stuart McConnell, said the decision supports the practical retention of local jobs and service continuity.

"We have supported the proposal from Cranes to novate the contract to Whelans and Cranes has done this with as a priority to ensure service standards and no local job losses for the East Gippsland community," Mr McConnell said.

Cranes Managing Director Michael Crane said his company was proud of the work it had delivered in partnership with Council.

"We've built a lot of strong relationships across the shire and take great satisfaction in the work our crews have done over the years," Mr Crane said.

"The Crane family has chosen to pivot their focus and pursue other opportunities. As such we're pleased to have worked with Whelans through this transfer to ensure local jobs are retained through a smooth transition.

"We wish Whelans every success and thank Council for the opportunity to be part of the region's road maintenance and improvements."

Whelans Group CEO Leigh Brennan, speaking on behalf of Company Director Charlie Whelan, said the company was proud to take on the expanded role.

"We've worked closely with Council for many years and know the importance of maintaining safe, reliable roads for local communities." Mr Brennan said.

"Our team lives and works here, so we take real pride in delivering quality outcomes across East Gippsland."

Mr McConnell thanked Cranes for their significant contribution since 2019 and said Council looked forward to continuing to work with Whelans to maintain local roads.

"We appreciate the cooperation of all parties involved in this transition."

Cranes Asphalting has been a key partner in maintaining and improving East Gippsland's roads for the past six years, including during fire recovery.

#### Faster planning approvals for East Gippsland

East Gippsland Shire Council has almost halved its planning permit approval times, making it faster and easier for landowners, residents, and businesses to get the green light on their projects.

In the September quarter, median approval times fell to just 43 days – down from 84 days during the same period last year. The percentage of permits approved within the legislated 60-day timeframe also jumped from 52% to 81%, reflecting a strong focus on service improvement and efficiency.

Mayor Cr John White said the results demonstrate the impact of targeted reforms and a renewed commitment to customer service across Council's planning operations.

"We've worked hard to streamline our internal processes and cut unnecessary red tape to better support our community," John said.

"Even with increasing complexity in the State's planning system, our team has delivered faster results – helping landowners move forward with confidence."

These results place East Gippsland ahead of both the statewide and Gippsland regional averages, exceeding Council's own performance targets.

Cr White said the achievement reflects Council's broader commitment to supporting growth, reducing regulatory barriers, and improving the customer experience.

"It's about making it easier to do business and improve services for the people who live and invest in our region," John said.

"Planning isn't always simple – our team regularly works through complex legislation, neighbour concerns, and the need to balance local aspirations with State requirements."

Town planner and director at Crowther and Sadler, Kate Young, agrees that they have certainly noticed an improvement in the processing of applications.

"This results in real benefits for our clients by delivering faster outcomes, meaning projects don't lose momentum."

"The improved efficiency assists us with maintaining a good working relationship with Council's Planning department."

To further support the community, Council staff are available daily to assist with planning enquiries. A new, easy-to-use online customer platform will also launch soon, giving residents faster, clearer access to planning information specific to their properties.




