


Kevin Parker 1942-2025



Kevin was born in Melbourne in 1942. He and his family subsequently moved to Echuca where his mother had a dress shop. Kevin and his brother Philip spent much time around rivers, fishing and hunting with their father.

Kevin studied architecture at the RMIT, and later began his architectural illustration career, working for many of the top architects in Australia.

His life-long passion for the bush and rivers led Kevin, with his partner Joanna, to buy "Springfields" at Deddick in 1990.

Kevin rendered a detailed set of drawings of the iconic McKillop's Bridge and exhibited these in 2003 at the Gippsland Art Gallery (Sale), along with pastel drawings of fire-affected local landscape following the extensive bushfires of 2003.

His love for drawing and painting the awe-inspiring landscapes all around him, has led to successful exhibitions in Sale, Orbost, Castlemaine, Cooma, and Bairnsdale.

Kev died on November 6th, 2025 at the Bairnsdale Hospital following a long battle with Parkinson's Disease.

How the Errinundra to Snowy Wellbeing Spaces changed healthcare

"For decades, people here faced a stark choice: travel hours on dangerous roads or go without."



Local, timely, proactive care

"If it wasn't for [the nurse]... my partner could have lost her leg. It saved her leg."

"People don't talk to each other much these days... After the fire, everyone kind of looks after themselves."



Connection, trust, and hope

"This is bringing the community together... Even people who hadn't spoken to each other for years, I saw them talking to each other in the waiting room."

"We are not particularly computer savvy, but if we had opportunities to have face-to-face videoconferencing health things, I think that could be handy."

"Got to sit down with [the nurse] and do telehealth with Dr [name of GP], get the bloods and pathology, that was super handy."

"You travel a long distance, wait in a waiting room with sick people, and then the doctors tend to just stare at their computer and want to get you out quick."

Pedal power: Business Support Voucher Program shifts Snowy River Cycling up a gear

Earlier this year, Orbost-based business Snowy River Cycling received support through the East Gippsland Shire Council's Business Support Voucher Program. For owner-operator Michelle Webb, the program was not just helpful – it was a turning point.

"I genuinely believe this has been one of the most impactful initiatives to come out of the Forestry Transition Fund for small business owners," Michelle said.

"Navigating the Timber Transition Fund on your own can be daunting, especially when you're also the person running the business day-to-day. The voucher program was that missing link between local business owners and the State Government: it bridged the gap."

The program provides tailored, one-on-one professional support from local service providers, helping businesses build clarity, resilience and long-term growth. The program is by referral only and designed to support applicants of the DEECA transition fund.

Vouchers can be used to access advice in areas including business planning, financial management, marketing and operational support, as well as assistance to prepare applications for Forestry Transition Fund grants.

"Being connected with local mentors who understand our region made all the difference. The program wasn't just about developing business tools – it was about bringing clarity to what we wanted to achieve and how to get there."

Through the program, Michelle worked with local advisors, Stephen and Leecia Angus of Snowy Advisory, to develop a three-year strategic plan, which positioned her to successfully apply for support through the Victorian Government's Forestry Transition Program and ultimately allowed her to purchase an enclosed bike trailer and four e-bikes, expanding her guided cycling experiences across East Gippsland.

"This support gave me the ability to scale sustainably- to grow in a way that still holds onto our values of authenticity, service and local connection," Michelle said.

"Without the mentoring I received, I wouldn't be where I am now."

When asked what she hopes Council will continue to invest in, Michelle is clear:

"If we want to strengthen our local economy, it's not just about backing small businesses financially- it's about giving them the practical tools to succeed. And that comes from one-on-one, tailored mentoring. That's where real growth happens.

"Not another webinar. Not another generic workshop. Real conversations with people who listen, understand, and guide. I'm really thankful for this program. It helped me believe in the future of my business and the region we work in. That kind of support goes a long way."

The Business Support Voucher Program remains open to small businesses across East Gippsland and continues to play an important role in strengthening local economies, supporting transition and fostering new opportunities for growth. Jodie Ashworth new East Gippsland Mayor

Paynesville's Jodie Ashworth has been elected Mayor of East Gippsland Shire Council.

First elected as Councillor in 2024, Cr Ashworth brings experience in small business, tourism, maritime operations, financial counselling, conciliation or dispute resolution, and volunteerism to the role.

In 2023, Cr Ashworth was awarded a scholarship to the Women Leading Locally program, an initiative of the Victorian Government to increase the representation of women councillors and mayors in Victoria. Cr Ashworth has also completed a certificate in Community Leadership and Governance (Local Government).

"Being elected Mayor of East Gippsland is a privilege, and I accept this role with determination and a clear commitment to serve our community. I am honoured by the trust my fellow Councillors have placed in me," Cr Ashworth said.

"I am proud to call East Gippsland home. I have raised my family here, built businesses here, and worked alongside people through some of the toughest moments in our region's history."

Cr Tom Crook was elected Deputy Mayor. Cr Crook has been a Councillor since 2020 and served as Mayor in 2023-24 (the final year of the previous Council).

Cr Ashworth congratulated Cr Crook on his appointment, and thanked the outgoing Mayor and Deputy Mayor, Crs John White and Sonia Buckley, for their service over the past 12 months.

"I am committed to a term of strong governance, respectful behaviour, transparency and informed decision-making that aligns with community priorities as reflected in the Council Plan," Cr Ashworth said.

"I will lead with honesty, integrity, courage and independence. I believe I can bring people together, focus on solutions, and lead with fairness and a clear vision for our shire. We may come from different backgrounds and see issues differently, but our diverse knowledge, skills and experience is what makes this Council group strong.

"We must make decisions not just for the next budget cycle, but for the next generation. My commitment is to plan strategically for a financially sustainable, future-focused East Gippsland that is positioned strongly for decades to come."

Both Crs Ashworth and Crook thanked their fellow councillors for the confidence placed in them and expressed their commitment to working collaboratively, as a team, to represent the region.

Council CEO Fiona Weigall congratulated Crs Ashworth and Crook on their appointments and thanked Crs White and Buckley for their contribution.

"Our team looks forward to working with our new Mayor and Deputy Mayor, and the wider Council to achieve the best outcomes for our community. I wish you every success in your term of office."

News from the Shire

Council sets clear path for waste reform with new 10-year plan

A long-term shift toward a circular economy is now underway across East Gippsland, with councillors adopting a new 10-Year Waste and Recycling Services Transition Plan.

East Gippsland Shire Council's plan for the coming decade outlines a staged approach to modernising waste and recycling services across the shire, with a focus on reliability, fairness, and cost-effective delivery.

Mayor Cr Jodie Ashworth said the plan reflects the views put forward by locals.

"Our community is passionate about protecting the environment and making the most of our resources," Cr Ashworth said. "By planning ahead and investing wisely, Council will deliver reliable, efficient and environmentally responsible services."

The framework is designed to reduce waste, lift recycling rates, and guide investment in infrastructure that supports a circular economy.

Key actions endorsed are:

Introducing a Food Organics and Garden Organics (FOGO) service from 2027, alongside planning for glass recycling as mandated under Victorian Government reforms.

Expanding kerbside collections to more households, including rural areas.

Planning for booked hard-waste collections to help households responsibly dispose of bulky items and reduce illegal dumping.

Investing in new facilities, including a proposed organics composting site.

Ensuring services remain available, accessible and affordable through delivery models that reflect community benefit, current usage, and changing needs.

Supporting waste reduction, resource recovery, social enterprise partnerships and the establishment of local reuse programs.

Helping households recycle more and send less to landfill, easing cost pressures on Council and community.

More than 900 residents contributed to the plan through surveys, drop-ins and targeted consultation. Community feedback consistently highlighted the need for improved recycling options, expanded kerbside services and education. Ongoing engagement will continue as the staged actions are implemented.

The mayor added that the plan also sets the region up to manage rising waste costs in a fair and practical way.

"Council offers a broad range of waste and recycling services to support large and smaller communities. Our aim is to ensure we provide services that are accessible, affordable and align with the needs of our community now and in the future," she said.

ALF MATTHEWS TELLS ...

In 1956, when Min and Frank Matthews lived in the "old house" at Warm Corners (which was put up in a week according to a neighbour, and transplanted from a boggy spot to a not-so-boggy spot..), I had stayed with them. I rode the old half-draft horse Dick up the gully to Gilchrist's house (now on Manning's property, derelict.) which was then a decent three-roomed house.

I was intending to get some wattle-bark and hickory bark, but that night, I had a blackout, and rolled into the fire. When I came to, pretty badly burnt, I walked towards Clem and Dulcie's, then changed course and walked back to Min's. Had to stay 2 months in Delegate hospital, Jim Cameron drove me in, and I was well looked after there.

But, sorry to say, the old horse Dick got thrush in his feet, and Wally Matthews shot him. You can still see his bones up in the gully no doubt. He was a very good horse, half-human really. He used to harrow and plough, and he also worked for Frank Nevens at his Rising Sun Mill, pulling out silver wattle, which was then made into boxes I believe.

The hickory trees made excellent tool handles, shafts and so on. I used to work for Alan Taylor from Eden, sleeper-cutting with a broad-axe.. still got it too, if you want to learn to use it! Sleepers were 8"x 9" x 4½", and generally about 8' long. Timbers that were good for sleepers were box, stringy, gums, ash. I cut quite a lot out of the Warm Corners place.

On those flats there. Min and Frank grew good crops of carrots, parsnips, peas and tomatoes. Charlie Simpson grew good potatoes and pumpkins over on that sheltered flat you have the tipi on . He also had good lucerne on that gully paddock the road loops around. But later on he couldn't manage to keep the stock off it. His sen just let it go.

Since the barn. I have been pretty low. A man needs company. Joyce Simpson was a levely girl, used to give me things I needed, like a shaving brush, socks, you know... The new people coming into the Tubbut area strike me as very friendly people. It will be good for the community. As for their buildings, I think they should be left alone to build what they require for their own needs, at their

ha Dellicknors School Sagar & Beginning.

populated by quite a few large families: five children was a fairly small femily 50 years ago.

Where a clump of non-native trees can be seen, you can be fairly sure there was a house, the hills ringing with the cries and effouts of children. Fire has accounted for many of them, and people's memories are the only source of most of our local history.

Eleven years ago, when we arrived in the area, the Post Office was still operating out of the lovely little white house on the corner of Hebbs Road. (Kaus' plate)

At that time, the Delliciners School was operating in a bone fide school, the building having been soved from Delegate River about 4 years before. Pam, Lyn and Chris Cameran were attending the same school their mother had attended some 25 years earlier, 1972 was the last year for the Dellickhorsh school, in its third generation, and a few years later, the building and small plot of land were sold, by the lands department to Fred Kirk, Its present owners.

It seems unlikely that there will ever be another school opened at Delicknora, in these days of smaller families, and en Education Department which prefers a more centralised school, but you never know. Birth control methods may be outlawed, gold may be discovered.

The latest Delligknore school was the third, The first school had been down the bottom of the first hill up Mobbs Road; it had been attended by Ted Ingrem, Noel Hobbs, Sylvia Ingrem and their generation. Some children walked from the Bonang area to attend, corrying their boots.

The second school was in the Dellicknors Hall building, under the pines, next to Alan Cameron's current cattle yards. About 50 years ago, it was being attended by the parents of the third generation schools. Alan Cameron and his brothers and sisters, Jim and his brothers and eister, and others, which investigation will no doubt discover.

The third and final school began at Fellicure, the house which Alen and Sandy later had added to and removated to live in. The first teacher was Tony Orb, in about 1964.

in 1968, the school was moved into the schoolhouse, and the first teacher there was the wife of an earlier once Meria, wife of New Dawson, who was teaching atGoongerah while she taught at Dallisknore. She was followed by David Stevens, who provided the photo. The final teacher was Eric Duggen, a state wide reliever, who stayed just long enough to close the school down. The Toilets want to Tubbut, the shelter shed to Sonang, and the Tubbut teacher at that time, Briam Pomeroy picked some of the children up to attend Tubbut.


