

Local Facility Upgrades

EV Charger at Tubbut Hall

RACV have installed a Delta AC Max Smart 7kW single phase EV Charger which will be managed by the Gippsland Climate Change Network in partnership with the Tubbut Community Hall and Development Association. The electrical network only allows for slow charging at this stop - we estimate 2 hours for a full charge.

For those staying overnight contact Tubbut Neighbourhood House about local accommodation options. For others, the hall has rest facilities - and don't forget a bit of cash to grab some local honey from the Neven Honey stall across the road!

This charging station will support the growing government and services vehicle fleet, and help expand the nature-based tourism market - we think that paired with the slow charger in Buchan, this might make the McKillops Bridge scenic route the first EV accessible remote tourism drive!

This is thanks to a Tiny Towns Fund grant from @Regional Development Victoria.

Stay tuned for more updates about when the charger goes live on Chargefox.

We are just waiting on a cover and a technical component at then it will be ready to go.



Bonang Hall Amenities block

Washer/dryer is yet to come but it will be a great asset when it arrives.
















Ceramic Workshop

16 EARLY SETTLERS AT BONANG

Many have travelled the winding Bonang Highway. Some fear it others are indifferent, but most of us have been charmed by the green valleys that appear unexpectedly and the dense forests that step right up to the road's edge. The following is an account of Bonang's history written by the children of the Bonang School.

Bonang is situated on the Bonang River. Mount Bowen in the southeast, is about 4,500 feet nigh. Mount Coolanbaulon, to the east is about the same neight. Mount Tingaringy reaches 4,500 feet. YESTERDAY AND TODAY

In the early days there were no roads - only bush tracks for bullock waggons, but now there is a good road from Bonang to Orbost and Delegate. There is also a store, a Post Office, a telephone exchange and a fairly up to date school. Hundreds of wild norses used to roam these mills and clso nundreds of wild blacks. The last one of the black tribes died in his camp in Bendoc last year and was buried in the Bendoc cemetery. His name was Tongihi.

THE MARRIOTS

The first people to settle in Bonang were the Marriott brothers -- James, Robert and William and their wives. They settled somewhere about the year 1850 on the land which now belongs to Mr V.J. Ingram. Before settling in Bonang they lived at Cameramm about four miles from Bonang on the Delegate River. Bob Marriott and his wife came to Bonang about 120 years ago. Mary Anne Marriott used to drive a bullock team for logging and

plougning. Near her first home was a big gum tree which the blacks used to climb and call out for tobacco and sugar. Miss Mary anne Marriott planted 45 "Blac: Heart" cherry trees in Bonang almost 110 years ago. She was only four years old when she came to Bonang. The Marriott 'amily lived to ages ranging from 70 to 101 years.

THE FIRST BUSINESS MEN

The Dutcher's shop was start

-ed by Bob Johnson. Beef was
sold at 4d. 1b. and kangaroo at
2d. 1b. Mr. Jlancy owned the
hotel. It has only recently
fallen down. A man named Jones
owned the store but on all groc

-eries orought from N.S.W. a
duty was paid at the border
until Federation.

THE FIRST SCHOOL

The first school was "Honey -suckle Jottage" in the area called "The Range". The teacher -er was Mr. Armstrong.

MAIL DELIVERY

The mail was brought from Buchan over the Snowy River every forthight. It was brought on horse-back until the "Little Bill Road" to Orbost was opened. Messrs. Hugh and Frank Matthews drove the mail coach. GOLD MINING

Bob Marriott and his wife came from England in a ship

called "Cutty Sark," and when they found gold they decided to stay. The Marriotts were gold digging at Chinaman's Creek. Three men. Tom, Bill and Jim, found the "Rising Sun Mine." A company bought it and took \$44,000 in gold from it. The cost of putting in a race and water wheel plus the laying of tramlines was \$10,000 so the "New Rising Sun" company made a net profit of \$30,000 after paying \$4,000 in miners' wages.

Rates proposed to be below State cap

Doing more with less is the focus of East Gippsland Shire Council's Draft Budget 2025/26, which aims to deliver practical improvements, maintain services, and ease cost-of-living pressures on the community.

Mayor Cr John White said the budget reflects Council's commitment to finding efficiencies and delivering value in a challenging financial environment.

"As a new Council, we've taken a careful and considered approach to this year's budget," John said.

"We've proposed to keep the general rate rise to 2.0% – a full percentage point below the Victorian Government's 3.0% cap and under inflation. We understand that many households and businesses are feeling cost-of-living pressures, and this decision reflects our commitment to supporting the community while continuing to provide the services people rely on."

Chief Executive Officer Fiona Weigall said the Draft Budget includes embedded savings targets and marks the beginning of a Financial Sustainability Strategy, which will guide Council's efforts to identify long-term efficiencies and deliver value for ratepayers.

"Rates are essential to maintaining the services our community depends on," Fiona said.

"We've worked hard to strike the right balance between limiting the financial impact on ratepayers and ensuring high-quality service delivery. We encourage any resident experiencing financial hardship to reach out – we're here to help."

Almost 1,000 community members shared their views earlier this year, helping shape the Draft Budget.

"Your feedback has been valuable. You told us you want cleaner public toilets, better roads and footpaths, and stronger investment in local infrastructure. These priorities are reflected in our plans, with some improvements already underway and others embedded in this year's Budget," John said.

Key new investments for 2025/26 include:

\$3.332 million for road reseals

\$1m for a gravel road program

- \$3.18m Bairnsdale Aerodrome rehabilitation of taxiway and hangar apron*
- \$1.6m for the Cann River Waste Transfer Station
- \$1.441m for footpaths and related projects

\$530,000 for a drainage upgrade in Marlo

* Project dependent on grant funding

Major projects continuing from 2024/25 include:

\$4.823m for continued digital transformation aimed at simplifying systems and processes to make it easier for the community to interact with the council.

\$4.4m for the WORLD Sporting Precinct, Bairnsdale

\$1.56m for Livingstone Park, Omeo

\$5.7m for the Slip Road Maritime Precinct, Paynesville

\$8.34m for runway extension and lighting at Bairnsdale Aerodrome*

* Project dependent on funding

The Mayor said the Budget also prepares Council to respond flexibly to cost pressures and State-imposed obligations.

"We are up for the challenge. We're also strongly advocating on key issues impacting the community, such as the Emergency Services and Volunteers Fund levy and mandatory glass recycling collection," John said.

Council has also released a new four-year Council Plan, setting the vision and strategic direction for the next four years. It is guided by four themes:

Community wellbeing and social responsibility

Prosperity

Making the most of what we've got

Managing Council well

"This budget supports those goals and reflects what matters most to our community. Thank you to everyone who contributed their time and ideas, to Councillors for their leadership, and to our Council staff for their dedication and expertise," John said.

A new chapter in community connection has begun with the official launch of the East Gippsland Community Directory and Diary, held at the Council Chambers in Bairnsdale on Friday, May 9.

This new Directory is a centralised, easy-to-use digital tool designed to help residents connect with local services, groups, volunteering opportunities and events – all in one place.

East Gippsland Shire Council CEO Fiona Weigall described the initiative as a practical and much-needed tool that will make life easier for locals and help organisations reach their communities more effectively.

"Whether it's help, a hobby, or a way to give back through volunteering – it's now just a few clicks away," Ms Weigall said.

East Gippsland mayor, Cr John White, echoed this message, highlighting the directory's role in building strong, inclusive communities.

"Council is here to help build strong, connected communities," John said.

"This directory brings together programs, services, and activities, making it easier for everyone – regardless of age, background or location, to get involved and feel welcome."

Already featuring over 500 listings, the East Gippsland Community Directory can be accessed via **mycommunitydirectory.com.au**, with more listings being added regularly.

For those who prefer print, a downloadable PDF version will also be available – a valuable tool for community workers and those without regular internet access.

Developed in partnership with My Community Directory, a national not-for-profit platform, the project benefits from a broader network of experience. Executive Director Brentyn Parkin and National Memberships Coordinator Benjamin Pearce travelled from Queensland to attend the launch and celebrate the rollout.

Cr John White acknowledged the efforts of key staff in bringing the project to life, including project lead Rhonda James, and community engagement officers Riven Rijs and Kayden Harrison, who helped populate the directory with local listings.

"If your organisation isn't listed yet, we encourage you to get involved," John added. "The more groups we have onboard, the more valuable this resource becomes."

The East Gippsland Online Community Directory is now live and growing – a go-to guide for anyone looking to connect, contribute, or simply stay informed in their local area.

To explore the directory or add your community group go to: mycommunitydirectory.com.au/Victoria/ East Gippsland **Solar farm proposal to be decided by Minister for Planning** A proposal for a solar farm at 280 Bengworden Road, Bairnsdale, has been submitted to the Victorian Government's Minister for Planning.

The proposal is for an 85-megawatt solar installation and 70-megawatt battery energy storage system covering approximately 99 hectares.

The proponent, Elgin Energy, is an international energy company operating since 2009.

Under the Victorian planning system, the Minister for Planning is the decision-maker for all renewable energy facilities that are 1 megawatt or greater.

East Gippsland Shire Council Chief Executive Officer, Fiona Weigall said the formal notification of the proposal to Council and the community provides the opportunity for submissions to be made to the Minister.

"We are aware of community interest in the project and encourage community members to review the project documentation and consider making a submission to the Department of Transport and Planning," Ms Weigall said.

"Council will be making its own submission outlining the matters that we expect to be addressed in the assessment of the proposal."

"Council is not the decision-maker, but we will advocate for a thorough assessment of the proposal and for community views to be fully considered by the Minister."

Friendly reminder: Rates text message campaign launching soon

East Gippsland Shire Council will soon begin sending text message reminders to residents who are not on instalment plans and have not yet paid their rates in full.

The messages will include payment information and Council's contact details, making it easy for residents to get in touch to finalise payment or discuss available options.

The reminder texts will not contain any links and are simply a helpful nudge to connect with us.

If you're already on a payment plan or paying by instalments, you won't receive a message.

Mayor Cr John White said that there is a Hardship Policy in place for residents, offering a compassionate and accessible framework for ratepayers who are struggling to manage the payment of rates and charges in these challenging economic times.

"The most important step is to reach out to us as soon as possible, so we can understand your situation and offer support. We focus on collaborative solutions, free from judgment," John said.

"The Hardship Policy ensures that all ratepayers, regardless of their situation, receive the support they need. We want everyone to know that if they're facing challenges, we're here to help in any way we can."




